ABOUT DR. INGRID CAMPBELL

Dr. Campbell supports the Agency's training and quality initiatives that include the training division, Grow NJ Kids Quality Improvement Specialists (QIS), the Infant Toddler Specialists (ITS) and all the initiatives funded by the NJ Department of Human Services, Division of Family Development. Dr. Campbell is an experienced infant/toddler to adult learning specialist with over 40 years in early childhood center-based and family childcare, Title 1, special education, and higher education settings. She worked for NJ First Steps and Rutgers-Camden Institute for Effective Education to assess and mentor over 200 early childhood programs to promote standards-based best practices as outlined in state and national early education standards for center and family care.

Dr. Campbell started in early childhood as a teacher's assistant at the Fort Dix Child Development Center, and she has never looked back. Certified as a special education teacher from the College of New Jersey, Dr. Campbell has been a special needs advocate since 1992; she co-founded her community's family advocacy group, BEAM, to promote special education compliance in her school district. She became a SPAN parent, has been on her local board of education and continues to be an education/inclusion advocate to this day in New Jersey, Virginia and Maryland. Dr. Campbell believes that vision building always starts with the question, "What if...?" Connecting the 'what is' with 'what can be' has allowed Dr. Campbell to resolve complex issues between families and schools by simply reminding everyone that the most important person in the room is the child.

THE STOP, DROP AND ROLL APPROACH TO ADDRESSING BEHAVIORS THAT CHALLENGE

There is no such thing as a challenging behavior in and of itself — the challenging part comes from how a behavior interacts with what is around it — whether that be an adult, a peer, or the environment. It is not possible to enter a situation and "pull out" a challenging behavior. Instead, we think of behaviors as challenging our ability to function well, or be successful in a moment, or be well in a moment. In this way, behavior is always an interaction. We think of behavior as indicating a need that is asking to be addressed — almost like a fire alarm that indicates that action is needed. We believe that adults can take action to interrupt the behavior or reduce the factors that 'fuel' the behavior. We are asked to be responsive, not reactive, to the need that is being communicated.
